SETTING:

Historical Period

Medieval Period, 1348, reign of King Edward III

Place:

London, moving to surrounding countryside, then Welsh border

Weather: Initially, cold

Mood: Initially, gloomy

Other: The Black Plague is in full force, killing 1/3 of England's population and contributing a sense of foreboding to the exposition.

Plot Stage 3/Body Paragraph 3

Climax: The castle is besieged by the Welsh and food and water are running out. Robin volunteers to go for help to send word to Sir Peter's relative, Sir Hugh Fitzhugh. He has to use all his strength and wits to accomplish the mission. Finally he reaches John Go-in-the-Wynd, who immediately sets out to obtain help.

Plot Stage 2/Body Paragraph 2

Conflict, Rising Action: Robin tells Brother Luke that he is useless and helpless because of his legs, but Brother Luke solves the problem and takes Robin to the monastery. He tells Robin there is always "a door in the wall," and to remember to look for it. Robin doesn't understand. Brother Luke nurtures Robin both physically and mentally, teaching him skills he can use without his legs, as well as patience and perseverance, through wittling, reading, and writing. He helps Robin develop strength through swimming and eventually walking with crutches. Robin stops feeling sorry for himself, but when Brother Luke takes him to Sir Peter's castle, he still doubts he can be of use as a page. However he is welcomed warmly by Sir Peter, who has also suffered a physical injury. Robin learns that the castle is in continual danger from Welsh marauders. He continues his swimming and education, making a harp and learning to sing, while carrying out page duties that are within his abilities. He learns the value of "do[ing] a hard thing."

CHARACTERS

Protagonist: Robin de Bureford, a 10 y.o. nobleman's son, who has been crippled by some infectious disease. He was to become a knight, but now believes he will never fulfill his calling.

Antagonist: Robin's worst enemy is himself, because he is full of self-pity and self-loathing. He projects his own negative feelings about himself on his parents, Sir Peter, and society in general, sure they will have no use for a lame boy.

Other Important Characters

Brother Luke, a kind monk who undertakes to develop Robin's abilities and character

John Go-in-the-Wynd, a minstrel and messenger

Sir Peter de Lindsay, Robin's liege lord

Sir John de Bureford and Lady Maude, Robin's parents

Plot Stage 1/Body Paragraph 1

Exposition: Robin de Bureford is a 10 year-old son of a nobleman in Medieval England. Robin's fatherhas gone to fight the Scottish wars with Edward III and his mother has been called to be a lady-in-waiting for the Queen. Robin was to go train under Sir Peter de Lindsay as a page as the first step in becoming a knight, his expected vocation. His parents think he is cared for while they are gone. However, Robin had become ill and lost the use of his legs, and is unable to travel such a distance. There are no servants to care for him because they leave or die because of the plague. A kind monk, Brother Luke, appears and ministers to Robin. He plans to take Robin to the monastery.
